

40 Tons of Recycling

Help us reach our 40-ton goal! The City of Normandy is striving to divert 40% of our trash from the landfill with our recycling efforts. Normandy averages 100 tons of trash per month. Our recycling tonnage per month is only 6 tons. Normandy residents can do better!

Our "Single-Stream" recycling means that residents do not have to separate any of their recycling products. Simply rinse food from any plastic, glass or aluminum containers and toss them along with any paper material into your 64 gallon recycling cart provided by the City and set it at curb side on Friday morning.



Tips for Household Garbage Collection

- Lids **MUST** be kept closed on rollout trash carts. (to keep animals, birds, insects and rain water out of the rollout cart and to keep trash & debris inside the cart.)
- Plastic bags may be used for household garbage but **ONLY** when used inside of your rollout cart or trash can.
- Roll-out carts **MUST** be used for your regular trash collection and trash cans must be used for heavy-pick-up collection. Trash cans will not be collected on your regular trash day, only roll-out carts. Carts and cans must be

Citizens for the Advancement of Normandy and the Wayside Garden

It is with great pleasure that the City of Normandy acknowledges the community services that have been provided by the group known as C.A.N. (Citizens for the Advancement of Normandy). C.A.N. is a group of dedicated residents who volunteer their time and services for the betterment of the Normandy community. The Wayside Garden Project has been a huge success for 2011.

The third growing season at Wayside Community Garden was fruitful, despite the heat and drought. This year our gardeners have grown over 2,400 pounds of healthy, chemical-free produce for their tables. Of that amount, 725 pounds were donated to the food pantry at Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church.

The community garden is open to anyone living or working in the Normandy School district attendance area. Each garden member pays a small fee to use a plot each year, then harvests and enjoys what they have planted. In addition, they pledge to assist with the upkeep of the property in other ways so this prominent landmark remains a community asset.

Gateway Greening for the beautiful permanent sign, the Trulaski Family Foundation for the prairie garden, and others that will help start the house rehab process. The Cooking Matters adult cooking classes sponsored by Operation Food Search were a hit. The Wayside Community Garden was featured on KMOV Channel 4 weather segment and in "The Healthy Planet". Several of our gardeners have gone on to start successful school gardens in the area (Barak Obama Elementary School and St. Ann Catholic School). Wayside also served as the distribution site for Beyond Housing's 24:1 spring initiative, Progress in Bloom.

This garden is one of the most successful in the St. Louis area. Normandy's community garden, sponsored by Citizens for the Advancement of Normandy (C.A.N.), has received a lot of attention for its unique rain barrel system of watering. Hundreds of people from all over the area have visited our city because of the garden.

The Normandy Police Department

TRIBUTE TO A HERO

January 6th of 2012 marks a very important anniversary for the City of Normandy and the Normandy Police Department. When one thinks of anniversaries, they think of happy times and good memories.

On January 6th 1977, at 1045 in the morning, Normandy Police Officer Robert Dale Hoelzel responded to 7246 Natural Bridge, Horstmeyer Jewelers, for a Hold up Alarm. Officer Hoelzel was the first of two officers to arrive on scene.

When Officer Hoelzel's assist car showed up, he waved him off and told him to cancel the call.

Officer Hoelzel then entered the store to speak with the store owners, in what appeared to be a friendly conversation, based on the same principles we employ today in getting to know our residents and business owners. After the assist officer cancelled the call, he exited his police vehicle and also began walking towards the store. As he opened the door, Officer Hoelzel yelled to him "Look out he has a gun."

As the second officer crouched down near the door, he heard several gunshots and advised the pedestrians and shoppers in the parking lot to get down and move away from the building. The second officer eventually moved to a cover position behind his police car, which was parked in the lot. He then advised the dispatcher of an "officer in need of aid," at 7246 Natural Bridge. After completing the transmission, the suspect emerged from the store and fired several shots in his direction. The officer returned fire, unknowingly striking the suspect in the chest. The suspect was

able to run away through the back of the businesses and across Normandy Place to St. Andrews Ln.

Once on St Andrews Ln, the suspect forced his way into an occupied residence where he held the female resident hostage until he passed out from blood loss. At this time, the resident called the police and the suspect was taken into custody.

Back at 7246 Natural Bridge, responding officers entered the store and located the body of

Normandy Police Officer Robert Hoelzel. Officer Hoelzel had been struck twice by the assailant's gunfire. The fatal

shot was to the head of Officer Hoelzel. Officer Hoelzel succumbed to his wounds on the floor of this business.

Officer Hoelzel was survived by his wife Julie, and two children.

On January 6th, 1977, the City of Normandy lost a dedicated employee, resident, and role model to the city. We will never know how many lives Officer Hoelzel saved that day. All the jewelry store employees had been tied up, and lined up against the wall in the basement of the store. We will also never know the true intentions of the suspect on that day. He refused to cooperate with police and refused to make any useful statements to aid in the investigation. The suspect was later convicted of Capital Murder and was sentenced to life in prison where he later died due to complications associated with cancer.

During this anniversary period, I want to remind you of the deadly encounters that police officers throughout the world face on a daily basis. I also want to remind you that every last one of us is dedicated to keeping you, as well as the visitors to this city safe and secure in your daily activities.

Officer Hoelzel is memorialized in the Police Officer Hall of Fame, National Law Enforcement Officer Memorial Wall in Washington D.C., and on the Officer Down Memorial Page website at ODMP.org.

Mr. Hoelzel, thank you for your service to the City of Normandy and its residents. Our police department is proud of you and your heroic actions on that day. We are confident that you saved many lives that day, by sacrificing your own so that others could live. Your service, sacrifice and bravery to the citizens of Normandy will never be forgotten. Rest in Peace Sir.

FREE CANINE SNIFFS



The Normandy Police Department Canine Teams are now offering a free drug sniff of any used car that is bought by a resident of the city. In order to qualify for the sniff you must not have any drug related arrests, felony convictions, or outstanding warrants. The vehicle must be brought to the police department within two days of purchase. You must complete a liability release, releasing the City of Normandy and the canine handlers from any damage caused to the interior or exterior of the car by the dogs or the officer.

DECEMBER IS BURGLAR SEASON

As we approach the holiday season, just a reminder that this is not only a season of happiness and thanksgiving.

It is the season where we see an increase in residential burglaries. Please keep your windows and doors locked, and look out for your neighbors houses as well. Those of you that know me know that I was once a detective and handled these cases myself. I have seen the heartache and the pain caused by the offenders. In order to reduce the number of burglaries we must remain vigilant and committed to not allowing burglars the opportunity to ruin our holiday season. Please call 911 immediately if you see people or vehicles in your community that do not belong. We have a young aggressive police department that is eager to go after the burglars, but we need your help. Most importantly watch the backyards in your neighborhood. The majority of burglaries committed in Normandy are through a rear access point to the residence. If you are the victim of a burglary, please get out of your house immediately. There is no way of knowing if the suspect is still inside your house and what his or her intentions might be if they are confronted. Go to a neighbor's house and call 911. While waiting for our arrival, if possible, keep an eye on your house to see if you can get a suspect or vehicle description, and a direction of travel should they leave your house. By working closely as a team we can stop these senseless crimes.

AN HONOR FOR AN OFFICER

Major Tony Madigan has been selected, and will be attending the 248th session of the FBI National Academy. He will be attending the academy in Quantico, Virginia from January through March 2012.

The FBI National Academy is a professional course of study for U.S. and international law enforcement leaders that serves to improve the administration of justice in police departments and agencies at home and abroad and to raise law enforcement standards, knowledge, and cooperation worldwide. Its mission is "to support, promote, and enhance the personal and professional development of law enforcement leaders by preparing them for complex, dynamic, and contemporary challenges through innovative techniques, facilitating excellence in education and research, and forging partnerships throughout the world."

Less than 1% of all law enforcement officers will ever be given this opportunity.

PENS PROTECT PROPERTY

The Normandy Police Department has taken a proactive approach and purchased invisible marking pens. These same pens were showcased on local news channels. Residents and business owners can use these pens to mark their property.

The pens will be available by calling the Normandy Police Department Detective Bureau at 314-385-3300 ext. 3020 or 3021. Additionally, pens will be stored in all of the police department vehicles, and with the neighborhood watch coordinators. We also have several of the flashlights used to identify the marked property; these too will be kept in each patrol car and at

the police station. It our hope that you take advantage of these pens and mark your property so that we or other police departments can easily identify stolen property.

All sports equipment for the league has been provided by St. Louis Cardinal Care.



Holiday Safety

The winter holidays are a time of celebration to usher out the old and bring in the new. It is a time to make resolutions for the next year to come. Let's make resolutions to keep this holiday season safe. The following are some safety tips:

- If you go out and drink, please don't drive. Have a designated driver or call a cab to bring you home.
- When driving, please wear a seat belt.
- When backing out of your driveway or out of a parking space at the mall, please look twice for pedestrians walking by, especially small children whom you may not see on first glance.
- Hot objects such as ovens, fire places, candles, electric heaters, and heating pads can be dangerous to small children since they will reach out to touch or grab things and are more susceptible to harm.
- Deep fried turkey or an oven-baked ham is a great holiday entrée, but pouring grease down the kitchen sink regularly can cause costly sewer blockage. Instead, pour used grease and oil in a container, freeze it, then dispose of it in the trash.



Remember the 3 P's: Pets, Plants, Pipes

Residents with small pets need to remember coyotes will attack pets left alone outside at night during the winter. Stay outside in the yard with your pets when they go out; don't leave them alone. Bring cat food and dog food inside. Bring your pets in, making a place for them when temperatures reach freezing. They depend on you for protection.

Don't forget about the plants outside. Prepare your gardens for winter.

Pipes outside can freeze until they burst or sustain damage. Turn off your outside water line from inside house then turn on the faucet and drain the line from the outside.



Conserve Water Now, Save Money Later (Check Your Toilet Bowl!)

A leak of one drop per second can waste 3000 gallons of water per year. Toilet leaks are one of the most common water leaks. To test your toilet, put some food color in the tank. DO NOT FLUSH! Wait 15-20 minutes, then check the toilet. If the water in the bowl is colored, you have a leak.

Get Ready for Winter!!!



Prepare Your Home For Winter Weather

- Have your smoke detector and carbon monoxide detector batteries checked
- Have furnace and hot water tank checked
- Inspect windows for damage or leaks
- Make sure storm doors function properly
- Check gutters; make sure they are properly attached and cleaned out
- Turn off outside water faucets from inside the house
- Store garden hoses, tools, lawn mowers, barbecue grills, lawn chairs, and flowerpots
- Have duct work cleaned.
- Have your fireplace inspected and cleaned
- Do not overload electrical outlets (wall socket) beyond their capacity with extension cords or multiple plugs.
- Make sure flashlights have batteries
- Take extra care; never leave burning candles unattended
- Go over your emergency evacuation drill with your family, plus, have a location to meet once safely outside the house
- Have a checklist at the front door for what kids should have before leaving the house for school: gloves, hats scarves, hand warmers, and backpacks
- Keep a supply of salt, sand and a snow shovel



Winter Auto Safety Tips

- Pack your emergency kit with jumper cables or booster pack, scraper with brush, and a can of fix-a-flat
- Have your battery, windshield wipers, transmission belts, brakes, brake lights, tires, and radiator checked.
- Keep a gallon of windshield wiper fluid or de-icer in your trunk (and extra bottles in your basement or garage)
- Make sure you have your auto insurance card in your car
- Keep your license plates and lights clear of dirt and debris
- Do not allow your car to idle for warm up in an attached garage to your house. Carbon monoxide fumes can be lethal.
- When braking while driving, give yourself plenty of distance to avoid sliding or brakes locking up. Keep extra distance between your car and the car in front of you while waiting at a stop light or while driving on the street or highway.

WINTER SERVICE SCHEDULE 2011/2012

Our Public Works and Sanitation employees' normal starting schedule is at 7:00 a.m. Monday through Friday. Please have all items to be collected set out by 7:00 a.m. on your collection day. Please place all roll-out trash carts, trash cans, bundles of limbs and yard-waste bag(s) to be collected at the curb on the proper day.

HOLIDAYS

There are 8 weeks in a calendar year that contain 9 holidays: New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Day, President's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Veteran's Day, Thanksgiving Day together with the Friday after Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. During a week containing one of the above Holidays, our crew will work a four-day week. Regardless of what day of the week the holiday falls on, the collection procedure is the same:

- The first work day of that week, our crew will provide service to Ward 1...
- The second work day of that week, our crew will provide service to Ward 2...
- The third work day of that week, our crew will provide service to Ward 3 and to Ward 4...
- The fourth work day of that week, our crew will provide recycling collection to all four Wards.


The exception to the rule will be Thanksgiving Holiday when there will be NO recycling collection on the Friday after Thanksgiving. Crews will provide service to Ward 1 on Monday, Ward 2 on Tuesday & Wards 3 & 4 on Wednesday providing NO heavy-pick-up service or recycling service for that holiday week.

APPLIANCE COLLECTION

Appliances will be collected on Wednesday of every week that does not contain a holiday. Please set items out for collection by 7:00 a.m. There is a \$10.00 charge for each appliance set out for collection. These items must be pre-paid at City Hall. Residents will receive a collection tag/sticker to be placed on each appliance to be collected. Material set out for collection without tag/sticker is subject to receive a summons. Missouri Senate Bill 530 prohibits the disposal of appliances in landfills.

LEAF-VACUUM SERVICE

There will be no charge for Normandy's leaf-vacuum service which operates during the fall and spring months and is designed to assist Normandy residents with leaf disposal. Residents may rake leaves to be collected to the curb, but not into the street. Our leaf-vacuum service will provide leaf collection on a regular basis until April 2nd, 2012 when it will stop until October.



YARD WASTE COLLECTION

Yard waste will be collected on your regular trash collection day. Yard waste (in paper yard waste bags only) may not be set out any other day of the week. Normandy residents may set out yard waste to be collected at curb in biodegradable Kraft paper yard waste bag(s) or piles of bundled limbs only. For smaller items or piles, residents may use brown paper grocery bags for disposal. Trashcans are no longer accepted for yard waste. These Kraft bags are readily available from vendors everywhere. Limbs that are set out for yard waste must be bundled into piles that are 12 inches maximum in diameter and 4 ft maximum in length. Yard waste is defined as berries, grass, gumballs, leaves, twigs, small branches and weeds. Please do not co-mingle yard waste & household garbage in same container. Due to tight Environmental Protection Agency & the Missouri Department of Natural Resource regulations, yard waste in plastic bags, plastic of any kind, and/or any items that are not yard waste will not be collected as yard waste. Missouri Senate Bill 530 prohibits the disposal of yard waste in landfills. Please keep yard waste and household trash separate.

LIMB-CHIPPING SERVICE

During winter months all material for disposal must be cut into 4 ft. lengths and tied into bundles and placed at curb for collection. During the spring and summer months (after April 2nd, 2012), residents having limbs and branches for disposal may set their material at curbside for our weekly collection. Crew will begin the collection on Monday and chip limbs until the entire city has been serviced. There will be no charge for

Normandy's limb chipping service which is designed to assist Normandy residents that service their own trees. All limbs and branches for disposal may be placed at curb for the limb chipper. Limb chipping service will not operate after October 12th, 2011.

WOOD CHIPS/MULCH

Wood chips from our limb-chipper and mulch materials are available free of charge to all Normandy residents that can use chips or mulch. Bring a container or pick-up truck to the City's Public Works Facility 5800 Bermuda Road between 7:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.



TRASH DUMPSTER

The City offers a 2-cubic yard trash dumpster for large household clean-ups. Residents who need a trash dumpster may apply in person at Normandy City Hall. Payment is due at time of application. Dumpsters are issued for a 7-day period on a "first-come, first-served" basis. This service has a fee of \$14.00 for each dumpster empty. Please call the Sanitation crew at (314) 486-2182 if you finish with the dumpster prior to the seven-day time period. This will assist our sanitation department in more efficiently delivering trash dumpsters to other residents. The Environmental Protection Agency & the Missouri Department of Natural Resources regulate collection of items discarded into dumpsters, see application for details. Please do not place items that we do not collect into the dumpster.
