This is a picture of the Hardy House, so called because its last owner was the Hardy family of Hardy Salt fame. Sitting on 3 acres at the intersection of Bermuda and Florissant Roads, the estate is known as Wayside, so named by the matron of the family, Jane Hardy and today the site of Wayside Community Garden.

The house itself was built between 1891 and 1893 by either John Mullanphy Cates or his sister, Elizabeth Patterson LaMotte. The Cates were the first occupants. The property was sold on December 1, 1916 for \$9400 to Florence Liebke who sold it to the Hardy's on De-

cember 31, 1918 for \$8500. Additionally they assumed a mortgage with an unpaid principal of \$5000.

On July 15, 1965, Jane Hardy donated the property, her beloved Wayside, to the Normandy School District to "be used exclusively for public school purposes . . . the grounds for the study of horticulture and ornithology . . . and for the exhibition of arts and crafts". The house was to be used "... for instruction of the children of the District . . . and to provide living accommodations for teachers as the need arises". Any athletic facilities or events, including swimming, were prohibited.

For a number of years the house served as a reading

restoration, but its future hangs in the balance.



clinic and then as the offices for food services for the Normandy Schools. In 2009, the district leased the property to CAN and the establishment of one of the largest community gardens in the region was soon to follow.

Today the Hardy House sits in a state of disrepair. The community garden uses a part of it for storage, but the rest is unused. Plans have been drawn for its eventual

Auto Theft Basics

As we approach our colder months we wanted to share some tips on auto theft and vehicle break-ins. While vehicle break-ins can occur anytime, auto theft, at least in this area seems to be seasonal. The majority of stolen cars occur when the temperature drops and cars are left unattended to warm up. Please take a minute to refresh yourselves on these tips and help eliminate this preventable crime.

The Auto Theft Basics:

The MOST important thing YOU can do is CALL THE PO-LICE to report a CRIME or any SUSPICIOUS activity. You have to be the eyes of your neighborhood. And remember you can always remain a pair of anonymous eyes!

In the United States, a vehicle is stolen every 21 seconds. Stolen cars, vans, trucks, and motorcycles cost victims time and money and increase everyone's insurance premiums. They're also used to commit other crimes. Don't be a victim of this serious crime.

The Basic Prevention Policy:

- Never leave your car running or the keys in the ignition when you're away from it, even for "just a minute."
- Always roll up the windows and lock the car, even if it's in front of your home.
- Never leave valuables in plain view, even if your car is locked. Put them in the trunk or at least

out of sight.

- Remove portable electronic devices such as smart phones and GPS navigation systems, including suction cup or bean bag type mounts. (Even the visible appearance of a suction cup ring on the glass windshield can be an enticement to a thief to break in and look for the GPS system.)
- Park in busy, welllighted area.
- Carry the registration and insurance card with you. Don't leave personal identification documents or credit cards in your vehicle.
- When you pay to park in a lot or garage, leave just the ignition or valet key with the attendant. Make sure no personal information is attached. Do the same when you take your car for repairs.

Add Extra Protection:

- Install a mechanical locking device — commonly called clubs, collars, or jbars — that lock to the steering wheel, column, or brake to prevent the wheel from being turned more than a few degrees. Use it!
 - Investigate security systems if you live in a hightheft area or drive an automobile that's an attractive target for thieves. You may get a discount on your auto insurance.

What About Carjacking:

Carjacking - stealing a car by force - has captured headlines in the last few years. Statistically, your chances of being a carjacking victim are very slim, and preventive actions can reduce the risk even more.

- Etch the vehicle identification number (VIN) on the windows, doors, fenders, and trunk lid. This helps discourage professional thieves who have to either remove or replace etched parts before selling the car. Copy the VIN and your tag number on a card and keep it in a safe place. If your vehicle is stolen, the police need this information.
- Approach your car with the key in hand before getting in. Look around and inside before getting in.
- When driving, keep your car doors locked and windows rolled up at all times.
- Be especially alert at intersections, gas stations, ATM's, shopping malls, convenience and grocery stores — all are windows of opportunity for carjackers.
- Park in well-lighted areas with good visibility, close to walkways, stored, and people.

If the carjacker has a weapon, give up the car with no questions asked, your life is worth more than a car.

Tips on how to avoid car break-ins:

Do not leave valuables in plain view: (GPS devices, lap tops, PDA's, cell phones, MP3's, wallets, purses)

Do not leave windows or sunroof open.

Do not leave doors unlocked.

Do not leave keys in the vehicle.

Do not leave the garage door opener in plain view.

Do not leave out items with personal information.

Do not move valuable items to the trunk while in public view.

Slow Down and use common sense before you leave your car.

We Remember Long Time Normandy Resident Leo J. Tevlin

Leo J. Tevlin, a St. Louis Television Pioneer, died at age 94 on September 12, 2017.

A Native St. Louisan who, at age 5, witnessed Charles Lindbergh fly over downtown for an awaiting parade crowd. Leo Tevlin would later become an Aviator himself serving in World War II and Korea as a Naval fighter pilot flying 77 missions.

Tevlin was inducted into the St Louis Media Hall of Fame in 2016 for his pioneering work as a Chief Engineer in helping to launch three television stations here. A cameraman for CBS' 1st network televised MLB Game of the Week



series with Dizzy Dean & Pee Wee Reese. Tevlin worked on network coverage of the Mercury, Gemini and Apollo space programs and later became part of the nations 1st E-N-G news gathering operation transitioning from Film clips in Newscasts to video tape & Live shot technology and paving the way for today's news gathering method used worldwide.

As one of the oldest living Amateur Radio Operators - licensed in 1934- (Ham Radio) Leo Tevlin help the Catholic Church with its missionary work & expansion into South America.

He retired in 1985 having worked for CBS Television for better than 40 years.

Before convalescing, Leo Tevlin lived in Ladue, a widower and father of eight children.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION: Yard waste will be collected | LIMB-CHIPPING SERVICE: During winon your regular trash collection day. Yard waste (in pa- ter months all material for disposal per yard waste bags only) may not be set out any other day of the week. Normandy residents may set out yard waste to be collected at curb in biodegradable Kraft paper yard waste bag(s) or piles of bundled limbs only. For smaller items or piles, residents may use brown paper grocery bags for disposal. These Kraft bags are readily available from vendors everywhere. Limbs that are set out for "yard waste collection" must be bundled into piles that are 12 inches maximum in diameter and 4 ft maximum in length. Yard waste is defined as berries, grass, gumballs, leaves, twigs, small branches and weeds. Please do not co-mingle yard waste & household garbage in same container. Due to tight Environmental Protection Agency & the Missouri Department of Natural Resource regulations, yard waste in plastic bags, plastic of any kind, and/or any items that are not yard waste will not be collected as yard waste. Missouri Senate Bill 530 prohibits the disposal of yard waste in landfills. Please keep yard waste and household trash sepa-

Our Public Works and Sanitation employees normal starting schedule is at 7:00 a.m. Monday through Friday. Please have all items to be collected set out by 7:00 a.m. on your collection day. Please place all roll-out trash carts, trash cans, bundles of limbs and yard-waste bag(s) to be collected at the curb on proper day.

must be cut into 4 ft. lengths and tied into bundles and placed at curb for collection. During the spring and summer months (after April 3rd, 2017), residents having limbs and branches for disposal may set their material at curbside for our weekly collection by Public works crew. Crew will begin the collection on Monday and chip limbs until the entire city has been serviced. There will be no charge for Normandy's limb chipping service which is designed to assist Normandy residents that service their own trees. All limbs and branches for disposal may be placed at curb for the limb chipper. Limb chipping service will not operate after October 11th, 2017.

TRASH DUMPSTER: The City offers a 2-cubic yard trash dumpster for large household clean-ups. Residents having a need for a trash dumpster may apply in person at Normandy City Hall. Payment is due at time of application. Dumpsters are issued for a 7-day period on a "first-come, first-served" basis. This service has a fee of \$25.00 for each dumpster empty. Please call the Sanitation crew at (314) 486-2182 if you finish with the dumpster prior to the seven-day time period. This will assist our sanitation department in more efficiently delivering trash dumpsters to other residents. The Environmental Protection Agency & the Missouri Department of Natural Resources regulate collection of items discarded into dumpsters, see application for details. Please do not place items that we do not collect into the dumpster.

SANITATION SCHEDULE: Sanitation employees begin their day at 7:00 a.m. Monday thru Friday. Please place all roll-out trash carts, trash cans, bundles of limbs and yard-waste bag(s) to be collected at the curb on proper day. Residents living in all wards will receive household garbage collection and yard waste collection on your specific day. Please place only roll-out trash cart and any yard-waste bag(s) to be collected at the curb but not in the street. Please remove roll-out trash cart from curb at end of each day.

MONDAY - Service is scheduled for residents living in Ward 1.

Heavy pick-up collection will be dropped from any week that contains a holiday allowing residents to receive two collections {one household collection & one recycling collection during a holiday week. Material will be collected from all 4 wards on this day. Appliance collection must be paid for in advance of collection at Normandy City Hall.

You may however place your paper recycling items in a paper grocery bag if you wish.

HOLIDAYS

There are 9 weeks in a calendar year that contain 10 holidays; (1) New Year's Day, (2) Martin Luther King Birthday, (3) President's Birthday, (4) Memorial Day, (5) Independence Day, (6) Labor Day, (7) Veteran's Day, (8) Thanksgiving Day together with the (9) Friday after Thanksgiving Day and (10) Christmas Day.

During a Holiday week , our crew will work a fourday week. Regardless of what day of the week the holiday falls on, the collection procedure is the same:

- The first work day of that week, our crew will provide service to Ward 1...
- The second work day of that week, our crew will provide service to Ward 2...
- The third work day of that week. our crew will provide service to Wards 3 and to Ward 4...
- The fourth work day of that week, our crew will provide recycling collection to all four Wards.

The exception to the rule will be Thanksgiving Holiday when there will be NO recycling collection on the Friday after Thanksgiving. Crews will provide service to Ward 1 on Monday, Ward 2 on Tuesday & Wards 3 & 4 on Wednesday providing NO heavy-pick-up service or recycling service for that holiday week.
