Normandy is a community that prides itself on clean parks and neighbors carabout


Normandy is a progressive city. Normandy is a place where government services are dependable and efficient, where new ideas are embraced with enthusiasm and energy that encourages environment for success.

SPRING SERVICE SCHEDULE for Public Works and Sanitation

SANITATION SCHEDULE: Sanitation employees begin their day at 7:00 a.m. Monday thru **Friday.** Please place all roll-out trash carts, trash cans, bundles of limbs and yard-waste bag(s) to be collected at the curb on proper day. Residents living in all wards will receive household garbage collection and yard waste collection on your specific day. Please place only <u>roll-out trash cart</u> and any <u>yard-waste bag(s)</u> to be collected **at the curb but not in the street**. Please remove roll-out trash cart from curb at end of each day.

MONDAY - Service is scheduled for residents living in Ward 1.

The following streets are within the boundary of **Ward 1** and will be serviced on Monday: (*streets are listed alphabetically*). Annex Court, Atherstone Drive, Bermuda Avenue {*addresses from 5621 to 6114*}, Blandford Drive, Brand Avenue, Dartmoor Drive, Ellington Drive, Holborn Drive, Paddington Drive, Parchester Drive, Sanborn Drive, Sheriton Drive, Tuxedo Court, Wincheslea Drive, Wooddale Lane and Woodstock Road.

TUESDAY - Service is scheduled for residents living in Ward 2.

The following streets are within the boundary of **Ward 2** and will be serviced on Tuesday: (*streets are listed alphabetically*). Belwood Drive, Bermuda Court, Bermuda Avenue {*addresses from 1000 to 5615*}, Colton Drive, Donbar Drive, Faraway Drive, Horizon Drive, Kirkland Drive, Olene Drive, San Bernardino Avenue, San Diego Avenue, Bishop J. A. Johnson Lane, Santa Monica Avenue, Skyview Drive, Stanwood Drive, Winslow Drive & Winward Drive.

WEDNESDAY - Bulky items collection and appliance collection for residents living in ALL 4 Wards.

Bulky items or heavy pick-up collection and "Appliance" collection will remain on Wednesday. Larger items like dressers & chairs may be placed at the curb for collection on this day. There is a \$10.00 charge for each "Appliance" collected. Heavy pick-up collection will be dropped from any week that contains a holiday allowing residents to receive two collections {one household collection & one recycling collection} during a holiday week. Material will be collected from all 4 wards on this day. Appliance collection must be paid for in advance of collection at Normandy City Hall.

THURSDAY - Service is scheduled for residents living in Ward 3 & in Ward 4.

The following streets are within the boundary of **Ward 3** and will be serviced on Thursday: (*streets are listed alphabetically*). Augusta Avenue, Bermuda Avenue, {*addresses from 415 to 933*}, Circle Drive, Cool Valley Drive, Contour Drive, Florissant Road {*addresses from 7320 to 8115*}, Lacorn Court, Marietta Avenue, Nacomis Drive, Natural Bridge Road {*addresses from 7263 to 7855*}, Oakmount Avenue {*addresses from 3700 to 3748*}, Pasadena Blvd, Rosedale, St. Ann's Lane, Springdale Drive, Waco Drive, Walker Lane.

The following streets are within the boundary of **Ward 4** and will also be serviced on Thursday: (streets are listed alphabetically). Arcola Drive, Florissant Road {addresses from 7806 to 8242}, Lucas Lane, Natural Bridge Road {addresses from 7200 to 7900}, Normandy Place, Oakmount Avenue {addresses from 3600 to 3620}, St. Andrews Place, St. Mary's Lane, Wallingsford Avenue.

FRIDAY - Recycling collection is scheduled for Friday: Recycled goods will be collected from all four wards on Friday. Our goal is to reduce the flow of trash into the landfill by 40% by recycling. Limit items placed in recycle cart to recycling items only. Please do not store food or household trash in your recycling cart. Please do not place recycling products in any type of plastic bag. You may however place your paper recycling items in a paper grocery bag if you wish.

HOLIDAYS

There are 9 weeks in a calendar year that contain 10 holidays; (1) New Year's Day, (2) Martin Luther King Birthday, (3) President's Birthday, (4) Memorial Day, (5) Independence Day, (6) Labor Day, (7) Veteran's Day, (8) Thanksgiving Day together with the (9) Friday after Thanksgiving Day and (10) Christmas Day.

During a Holiday week, our crew will work a four-day week. Regardless of what day of the week the holiday falls on, the collection procedure is the same:

- The first work day of that week, our crew will provide service to Ward 1...
- The second work day of that week, our crew will provide service to Ward 2...
- The third work day of that week, our crew will provide service to Wards 3 and to Ward 4...
- The fourth work day of that week, our crew will provide recycling collection to all four Wards.

The exception to the rule will be Thanksgiving Holiday when there will be NO recycling collection on the Friday after Thanksgiving. Crews will provide service to Ward 1 on Monday, Ward 2 on Tuesday & Wards 3 & 4 on Wednesday providing NO heavy-pick-up service or recycling service for that holiday week.

Preserving Our History: Spotless Town Survey

In April of 2016, the City of Normandy was awarded a National Park Service matching grant to conduct an architectural/historical survey of a small subdivision in our town called Spotless Town. Nestled between I-70 to the north, Bermuda Road to the west and Pasadena Park to the south, Spotless Town is a neighborhood of 65 houses of similar architectural style that were built in the early thirties. The first houses in the subdivision were sold just before the beginning of the Great Depression in October, 1929. Lynn Josse, a consultant hired to lead the survey adds: "Prices were reduced for 1930 and the subdivision had enough success that the owners kept building new houses into 1931." An advertisement dated September 8, 1929 (see below) trumpets that the houses came with Murphy beds, a built-in cooler, linen and china closets and a gas heater, among many other things.

What you need to know about Sanitation and Public Works

Our Public Works and Sanitation employees normal starting schedule is at 7:00 a.m. Monday through Friday. Please have all items to be collected set out by 7:00 a.m. on your collection day. Please place all rollout trash carts, trash cans, bundles of limbs and yard-waste bag(s) to be collected at the curb on proper day.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION: Yard waste will be LIMB-CHIPPING SERVICE: During wincollected on your regular trash collection day. Yard waste (in paper yard waste bags only) may not be set out any other day of the week. Normandy residents may set out yard waste to be collected at curb in biodegradable Kraft paper yard waste bag(s) or piles of bundled limbs only. For smaller items or piles, residents may use brown paper grocery bags for disposal. These Kraft bags are readily available from vendors everywhere. Limbs that are set out for "yard waste collection" must be bundled into piles that are 12 inches maximum in diameter and 4 ft maximum in length. Yard waste is defined as berries, grass, gumballs, leaves, twigs, small branches and weeds. Please do not co-mingle yard waste & household garbage in same container. Due to tight Environmental Protection Agency & the Missouri Department of Natural Resource regulations, yard waste in plastic bags, plastic of any kind, and/or any items that are not yard waste will not be collected as yard waste. Missouri Senate Bill 530 prohibits the disposal of yard waste in landfills. Please keep yard waste and

ter months all material for disposal must be cut into 4 ft. lengths and tied into bundles and placed at curb for collection. During the spring and summer months (after April 3rd, 2017), residents having limbs and branches for disposal may set their material at curbside for our weekly collection by Public works crew. Crew will begin the collection on Monday and chip limbs until the entire city has been serviced. There will be no charge for Normandy's limb chipping service which is designed to assist Normandy residents that service their own trees. All limbs and branches for disposal may be placed at curb for the limb chipper. Limb chipping service will not operate after October 11th, 2017.

WOOD CHIPS/MULCH: Wood chips from our limb-chipper and mulch materials are available free of charge to all Normandy residents that wish chips or mulch. Bring a container or pick-up truck to the City's Public Works Facility 5800 Bermuda Road between 7:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Monday— Friday.

TRASH DUMPSTER: The City offers a 2-cubic yard trash dumpster for large household clean-ups. Residents having a need for a trash dumpster may apply in person at Normandy City Hall. Payment is due at time of application. Dumpsters are issued for a 7-day period on a "first-come, first-served" basis. This service has a fee of \$25.00 for each dumpster empty. Please call the Sanitation crew at (314) 486-2182 if you finish with the dumpster prior to the seven-day time period. This will assist our sanitation department in more efficiently delivering trash dumpsters to other residents. The Environmental Protection Agency & the Missouri Department of Natural Resources regulate collection of items discarded into dumpsters, see application for details. Please do not place items that we do not collect into the dumpster.



6 Tips for Preventing Tax Fraud

Tax fraud can happen when someone uses someone else's identity to file a tax return and collect a tax refund that isn't his or hers or when someone falsifies tax information, such as inflating deductions to generate a larger tax refund.

Here are tips to protect yourself and prevent tax fraud from happening to you.

1. Don't click through links on tax-related emails.

Phishing is one of the "Dirty Dozen" tax scams, a list of common fraudulent tax schemes compiled by the IRS. Using this method, criminals send you an official-looking email that tricks you into clicking links and visiting websites that resemble IRS pages.

A phishing email may have a subject line or message that references your tax refund, Form W-2 information or tax account. It may even caution you about fraud attempts on your account.

Scammers could also install malware on your computer when you click on links and visit certain websites. This malware may capture your

online activity, such as the sites you visit and logon information, allowing thieves to steal from your financial accounts and commit tax fraud.

Generally, the IRS does not communications through electronic methods such as email, texts or social media messages. You can forward suspicious Web pages and emails to phishing@irs.gov.

2. Don't respond to suspicious calls.

Criminals pretending to be IRS agents may call and threaten you with arrest, deportation or other actions. Don't respond or give out personal information to anyone you're unsure of.

To check if a caller is actually an IRS employee, obtain the person's name, badge number and call-back number. You should also note his or her caller ID number. Then contact the IRS directly at 1-800-366-4484 to confirm that the caller is a real IRS agent with the legitimate need to contact you.

3. Check out your tax preparer.

Before choosing a tax preparer, consider verifying his credentials and checking out any disciplinary actions. Resources include the IRS's directory of federal tax preparers and disciplinary sanctions, your local Better Business Bureau, and any available state resources such as a directory of tax preparers or the state attorney general's office.

4. Watch your mailbox.

Tax information is often sent via regular mail. If your mailbox isn't secure, thieves can steal personal and financial information, such as details about your earnings, from W-2 and 1099 forms.

5. File your tax return as early as possible.

By filing your taxes as soon as possible, you could snag any tax refund you are owed before a thief has the chance to file a false return in your name.

6. Protect your personal information.

The IRS advises taxpayers to keep personal information secure.

Red flags that may raise concerns about the intentions of a tax preparer include:

- •Promises to give you a larger refund than other preparers (or guarantees a refund).
- Calculates fees based on a percentage of the refund, not a flat fee or hourly charge.
- •Tries to sell you extra services such as a guarantee that the tax preparer will reimburse you if he makes a mistake.
- Promises to resolve tax debt for pennies on the dollar.
- Asks you to sign a blank return or files the return without your approval.
- •Fails to sign your form and give you a copy of your return.

Specific actions to protect yourself include:

- •Use security software and firewalls on personal computers.
- •Don't use public computers and public WiFi hotspots to file your taxes.
- Update online passwords regularly.
- •Don't carry your Social Security card with you.
- •Check credit reports for accuracy at least every 12 months.
- •Keep tax records in a secure place.
